

Community Vision Workshops

Summary of Comments and Feedback

July 2021

In May 2021, the City of Santa Rosa hosted ten virtual Community Vision Workshops to gather community feedback on a draft Vision Statement and identify assets and opportunities that will be factored into the Santa Rosa Forward process. These interactive workshops provided community members an opportunity to:

- Learn about the Santa Rosa Forward process and the importance of the General Plan.
- Learn about the findings and major take-aways from the Existing Conditions analysis.
- Discuss a Vision for the future of Santa Rosa.
- Discuss what you like about Santa Rosa and what you would improve or change in the future.
- Identify ways you can stay actively involved in the project.

All workshops were conducted virtually through Zoom and included a series of polling questions followed by small group discussions. The following is a summary of the collective community comments from the over 160 participants and detailed notes from each of the 20 small group discussions, which included over 550 individual comments and ideas.

Workshop Dates

The Project Team held a total of 10 workshops on various dates and times, as shown in the following table. The workshop format allowed for at least one workshop in each Council District, and two bilingual and three Spanish language workshops.

Group Discussions on the Draft Vision Statements Summary

Each workshop included one or more smaller groups so participants could discuss specific ideas and the Draft Vision Statements in detail. The following is a summary of the major reoccurring themes and comments that were raised by the groups. Following this summary are detailed notes from all workshop groups.

Liven/Improve Downtown

- Add a greater mix of uses to Railroad Square.
- Better connect with public transit, including SMART.
- Use blank space in the city to hold events like food trucks, live music, pop-ups
- Focus on safe and active modes of transportation.
- Create an attractive and pedestrian-scale environment.
- Ensure that Downtown remains the heart of the city.
- Create housing for all stages and ages.
- Encourage housing affordability in Downtown.
- Create permanent outdoor seating and dining areas.

Increase Connectivity, Mobility and Access

- Enhance the public transit system, particularly in hard-to-reach communities.
- Ensure parks remain a major asset that is preserved and enhanced throughout the city.
- Connect bicycle paths and trailways throughout city.
- Make mobility more attractive through trees, landscaping, and pedestrian improvements.
- Ensure there are safe routes to schools.
- Encourage active/public transit from a young age.
- Fix potholes, especially in low-income neighborhoods.
- Ensure there is adequate parking and/or transit access for multi-family areas.

Neighborhood Revitalization

- Use blank spaces in the city to hold events like food trucks, live music, and pop-ups.
- Highlight neighborhood diversity, history, architecture.
- Focus new projects and amenities that are needed in specific neighborhoods: Roseland, Coddingtown, SRJC, West End, K-Mart site, and Downtown.
- Reinforce neighborhood identity and a sense of community.
- Encourage "front yard" conversations and block parties.
- Have a department of neighborhoods.
- Create a comprehensive affordable housing program/strategy.

- Encourage smaller housing like tiny homes and other creative solutions to provide housing for everyone.
- Promote Infill development and Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs).
- Ensure neighborhoods have adequate amenities.

Diverse and Cultural City

- Celebrate community art.
- Encourage a diverse mix of businesses (markets, restaurants, etc.).
- Promote and hold live music.
- Highlight native land and history.
- Leverage non-profits to help support neighborhoods.

Community Connection and Resilience

- Increase the cohesion and connection between each quadrant of the city.
- Breakdown physical and social barriers within the city.
- Create spaces for families to grow and thrive.
- Ensure Santa Rosa is resilience to climate change.
- Ensure Santa Rosa is resilience to fire hazards and has coordinated emergency evacuation and neighborhood preparedness.
- Expand English-second language courses.
- Provide aid to parents with children who both need to work (childcare, after school programs, etc.).
- Provide technical/career skills to minority families or low-income families and their children (also debt free clinics, university is not the only option, financial planning, future planning, retirement planning, how to own a business).
- Create an informational video on how to engage in the community/City processes.
- Utilize energy of the youth to get them involved.
- Continue the ongoing community discussions between residents/businesses and the City.
- Create better connections with nature.

Public Health and Safety

- Address the abundance of tobacco and alcohol advertising and availability.
- Focus on housing security.
- Provide mental health services and support.
- Identify racism as a public health issue.
- Create outreach and access to open space and recreational programming.
- Make it safer at night with more eyes on the street.
- Expand access to healthy and reliable food sources.
- Expand the number and distribution of community gardens
